HYMN HISTORY: SHINE, JESUS, SHINE

Graham Kendrick, the son of a Baptist pastor, began writing songs in the early 1970s and today is one of the most prolific British Christian singer-songwriters and worship leaders. His hymn *Shine*, *Jesus, Shine* has been at the top of church copyright license charts for over ten years.

Kendrick tells of writing the praise song: "I had been thinking for some time about the holiness of God, and how....his desire is for us to live in his presence. I wrote the three verses and 'road tested' it in my home church. It seemed incomplete, so I put it back in the file." Several months later he was asked to submit new songs for a conference song book and realized his three-verse song needed a chorus. The line 'Shine, Jesus, Shine' came to mind, and within about half an hour he finished the chorus.

Stanza one focuses on the light "shining in the midst of the darkness" and Christ as the "Light of the World" (John 8:12). This Light "set[s] us free by the truth…" (John 8:32). Stanza two reflects on coming before the "awesome presence" of Christ, where "the shadows [turn] into your radiance." Christ's brightness "consume[s] all my darkness." The final stanza focuses on how Christ's brightness may be reflected in our lives as "our faces display your likeness." The third stanza concludes with a petition: "May our lives tell your story."

Lord, the light of your love is shining In the midst of the darkness, shining Jesus, Light of the world shine upon us Set us free by the truth you now bring us Shine on me, Shine on me.

Shine, Jesus, shine Fill this land with the Father's glory Blaze, Spirit, blaze Set our hearts on fire Flow, river, flow Flood the nations with grace and mercy Send forth your word, Lord, and let there be light.
